## **Reading from the Old Testament:** *Isaiah 25:6 - 9*

On this mountain the LORD Almighty will prepare a feast of rich food for all peoples, a banquet of aged wine— the best of meats and the finest of wines. <sup>7</sup> On this mountain he will destroy the shroud that enfolds all peoples, the sheet that covers all nations; he will swallow up death forever. The Sovereign LORD will wipe away the tears from all faces; he will remove his people's disgrace from all the earth. The LORD has spoken. <sup>9</sup> In that day they will say,

"Surely this is our God; we trusted in him, and he saved us. This is the LORD, we trusted in him; let us rejoice and be glad in his salvation."

# **Gospel Reading:** Luke 24:1-12

On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. <sup>2</sup> They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, <sup>3</sup> but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. <sup>4</sup> While they were wondering about this, suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside them. <sup>5</sup> In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? <sup>6</sup> He is not here; he has risen! Remember how he told you, while he was still with you in Galilee: <sup>7</sup> 'The Son of Man must be delivered over to the hands of sinners, be crucified and on the third day be raised again.' <sup>8</sup> Then they remembered his words.

<sup>9</sup> When they came back from the tomb, they told all these things to the Eleven and to all the others. <sup>10</sup> It was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the others with them who told this to the apostles. <sup>11</sup> But they did not believe the women, because their words seemed to them like nonsense. <sup>12</sup> Peter, however, got up and ran to the tomb. Bending over, he saw the strips of linen lying by themselves, and he went away, wondering to himself what had happened.

#### Message

We live in an age of social media and conspiracy theories, as well as fake news. If that were not difficult enough for us, now there is AI (Artificial Intelligence) – robots and computers that can copy exactly what someone does, how they speak and act, and more worryingly, how they think. What are we to believe in this difficult, troubled, strange world of ours?

Is it that the truth is just too fantastic and amazing to believe? Is it that people are stubborn to change their opinions? Or are they challenged by the constant flow of different understanding? What are the subtle and underlying opinions and ways of thinking that stop us all from hearing truth, and adjusting our world view, or our lives accordingly?

So, as today, we read the gospel story and we see that the women, who went to the tomb out of devotion and love for Jesus, found it almost impossible to believe that he was raised from the dead. Then we discover that a group of men didn't believe them - something I'm sure the women were used to! We also reflect that powerful emotions were also at play - grief at Jesus' recent, unfair and dreadful death, and fear - at finding two men in white in the tomb instead of his body. No wonder there was confusion! But we also have to remember that we are reading a story written by Luke - an educated man, an intelligent author, and a Christian wanting to convince his readers of the truth that he knew - Jesus was alive and had been raised from the dead. Luke wrote his stories very skilfully, for, like all the gospel writers he invites us, his readers across the centuries, into the stories.

I have no doubt that those early Christians, as we are today, were convinced of the resurrection of Jesus not by an empty tomb (you can't argue anything by starting with nothing!) but by their experience of Jesus being alive - he mysteriously met them in their worship, he walked with them in prayer, and His Spirit continued the work of the Kingdom of God - making people whole, empowering the downtrodden, and changing and transforming lives with the Love of God.

There have always been conspiracy theories about the body of Jesus, but none of them mean anything up against the evidence of Christian people living out their faith, praying for their communities and their enemies, and standing by and loving the people who hurt the most and are most in need of love's security, and hope. And that's our hard job and difficult calling - knowing the risen Christ for ourselves, as well as the journeys of fear, guilt, and disbelief, we can live the resurrection and pray for a transformed world in the day and age in which we live. Happy Easter! **Amen**

Lord, we deeply desire that your resurrected presence will fill those people and places of pain and redeem them, bringing the new life that is so dearly needed. Touch every heart with your eternal love, filling each seemingly hopeless situation with the promise of resurrected, everlasting hope. Yours is the glory; risen, conquering Son.

Lord, the news of your rising was so amazing that even your closest friends struggled to believe it at first. We pray for all those we know who struggle to believe and trust in you. We ask you to help them ponder the evidence, just like Peter did, and to think seriously about what they see.
