

Dear Friends,

Easter Greetings! This last week through Holy Week and approaching Easter I've felt like a rogue bit of driftwood pulled round and round by a vortex and eventually pulled down into a plug hole to be spat out in the spring somewhere surrounded by chocolate wrappers and fading daffodils!

What I mean by that is that the story of Jesus in Holy Week is such an emotional roller coaster, and it pulls us into it and along with it. What starts as gossip and unrest turns into outright conflict and argument, this leads to power struggles and rudeness, bullying and a tragic, sad, unnecessary death. But this all happens to Jesus who we know and believe is in that story on God's behalf, standing with all who are suffering bullying, abuse, torment and oppression. This is what Jesus' ministry of love was about.

So, when Jesus prays with his disciples all night after eating a freedom meal with them, we are invited to the meal table and we notice the looks across the table and the atmospheres in the room. When we fall asleep with exhaustion in the moonlight, we awake to the guilt of feeling failures. When Judas betrays him, we know we would never have done such a thing, but when Peter denies him, we know actually, we could have done too. We either stand at the cross and watch him die, or run away because of fear, and we know the empty numb feeling of that first Saturday, waking up (if we've slept) to the realisation that it's all over.

The Saturday after Good Friday has always intrigued me, we pass over it all too quickly, we need to pause and feel that Jesus is dead, and feel the sense of dashed hopes and failed promises. It is on that day and with those feelings, that we may for the first time in the story ask the most important question 'Where is God in all this?'

It is the question that connects our world to the story of Jesus. Ongoing war in Ukraine, hostages in Palestine, Israel isolated by a call for a ceasefire, renewed political power in Russia, climate emergency, reduced powers of free speech while there's increased social media frenzy; hungry, tired, disengaged people fed up of politics - sometimes we really do live through the Saturday in which God was silent because he was dead.

Charles Wesley's famous words 'For all, for all my saviour died' begin to grapple with the question of where God is, and what he is up to. He was in hell smashing up the gates and letting people out! is part of the christian answer.

So where is God now? In our church, in our lives, in our communities of wealth as well as want, in hospital wards and mortuaries, care homes and war zones?

We can only begin to answer that question with our faith because on the first Easter day he burst the gates of hell! Those early christians stood up to the Romans, feared the Jewish Authorities of their day, but met in defiance anyway, and sang and prayed in prison cells because they found in their experience that Jesus was alive! They told again the stories of those frightened women first going to the tomb to anoint his body and finding 'He's not here, He is Risen'. They gradually came to find that God was walking along the road with them in a mysteriously familiar but unknown way, and they continued to do what Jesus had shown them before his death.

The Resurrection of Jesus is an explosion of life, meaning, purpose, defiance against opposition, and hope, that the answer to the question 'Where is God in all this' will never be 'He is not here'. He is here! I find Brian Wren's hymn (in Singing the Faith no 297) to be most relevant and powerful every year, I try and choose it to sing as long as I can throughout the Easter season!

Christ is alive! Let Christians sing. The cross stands empty to the sky. Let streets and homes with praises ring. Love, drowned in death, shall never die.

Christ is alive! No longer bound to distant years in Palestine, but saving, healing, here and now, and touching every place and time.

In every insult, rift and war, where colour, scorn or wealth divide, Christ suffers still, yet loves the more, and lives, where even hope has died.

Women and men, in age and youth, can feel the Spirit, hear the call, and find the way, the life, the truth, revealed in Jesus, freed for all.

Christ is alive, and comes to bring good news to this and every age,



till earth and sky and ocean ring with joy, with justice, love and praise.

### **Congratulations Audlem!**



Northwest in Bloom is the regional organisation that administers the Royal Horticultural Society's Britain in Bloom competition. It is one of the most effective and longest running environmental competitions in the UK and each year it grows in size and importance. As Part of Audlem's Britain in Bloom bid, Audlem Methodist Church was put forward for an "It's Your Neighbourhood" award. Local or community groups can join IYN, with the aim of making community improvements. The groups are assessed, with marks being awarded for Community participation, Environmental Responsibility, and Gardening Achievement. There are 5 levels of award: Establishing, Improving, Developing, Thriving and Outstanding, and groups can be supported to move up through the levels. However, Audlem Methodist Church achieved a level 5 Outstanding on their first entry! The judge commented that it was unusual to achieve this level on the first attempt, he was particularly impressed with the garden at AMC for retaining condemned trees and using them for carved features and benches- keeping all the wood on site. He was pleased that this was a safe place for children and could be easily accessed by the community. He complimented all the members of the church for their efforts in achieving such a unique garden.
